Hello from the CANAPE lockdown bunker.

Whilst the recovery of nature in lockdown has been highlighted, it is important to remember that we still need to find solutions to the systemic challenges we are facing, and that CANAPE seeks to address. In this edition of our newsletter, we provide updates on our work at paludiculture pilots, fish tracking, and some clues on our plans for the future.

In the early part of the year, we have been able to make good progress on the project, including completing our planned construction works in the Broads (UK), and nearly completing the first phase of the Sphagnum farm at Barver Moor (DE). and continuing the research on fish movements in De Leijen (NL). Education in Lockdown

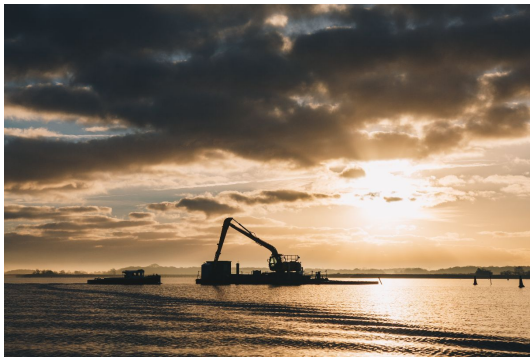
Using resources developed in the CANAPE project, the Broads Authority has published online educational materials on peat
