### Conclusions

- Smart Specialisation strategies are in place
- Clusters have additional political strategies influencing their work
- RIS3 are often used as a regional development strategy without concrete focus on innovation support
- A predominant regional perspective in cluster strategies, but increasingly an international focus and looking to cities and regions to lead the way

### Clusters wish for:

- A joint exhibition platform with innovative SMEs
- Overview of innovation and internationalization targets in each country
- Operative partnership arenas between policy-makers and clusters
- Political support and visions for international cross-cluster activities
- Connection between innovation strategies and task of internationalization, ex IRIS (interregional innovation strategy)
- Interregional innovation vision for the NSR

- Push for innovation connections between cities, regions, clusters and enterprises.

## Three challenges
